

Microsoft Family Safety


Microsoft Family Safety works on the latest Windows Devices (Windows Vista, 7, 8, Xbox 360, Xbox 1 and Windows 8 phones) It has a piece of client software on the device that reports to a web console that you can monitor and control what your children access.

You can download Family Safety from windows.microsoft.com/en-gb/windows/set-up-family-safety on a Windows Vista or Windows 7 device. On Windows 8.1 devices the software is already installed.

You need to create a Microsoft email account to manage the users and their devices.


The way Family Safety is set up differs depending which version of Windows you use. Use the information in the setup page above to set your particular system up.

Once logged in you can manage which applications individual children use, which websites or types of website they visit, which games they play and even when they can use the device. If they want to access something that is blocked they can make a request which you can react to remotely, for example from work or via your smart phone.
